The English Language Program at the University of Michigan Northwood Community Apartments offers an educational and enjoyable program for non-native speakers of English four semesters per year. We have English classes for **both adults and children**. Our class participants and their families also enjoy services which help them to practice their English, meet other people, and get to know the area and culture here.

Classes are small in size (8—18 participants) and conveniently located on the University of Michigan North Campus. In addition to classes, the English Language Program offers field trips, social activities, and native English-speaking Volunteer Partners for class participants.

English Language Program staff are professional teachers with experience and degrees in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages, linguistics, foreign language, education, or related fields. SPECIAL FEATURES

Besides classes, the English Language Program offers the following special features for class participants. These special features are designed to help participants and their families practice their English, meet other people, and get to know the area and culture here.

FIELD TRIP OR SOCIAL ACTIVITY

There will be a special event held each semester for class participants and their families. This may be a field trip to an interesting place or event in southeastern Michigan or the surrounding area; or it may be a party, sing-a-long, game night, or other social activity. Class participants can bring their families to this special event. The event will be scheduled on a weekend.

VOLUNTEER PARTNERS

Native speakers of English will participate in some classes, field trips, and social activities. These people are from Northwood and the surrounding community.

CONVERSATION PARTNERS

Some of our Volunteer Partners will be Conversation Partners. A Conversation Partner is a native speaker of English who would meet with you for one hour per week to speak English with you. Some Conversation Partners might also want to speak your language with you for another hour each week. During the one or two hours per week you meet with your Conversation Partner, you can do different things such as going for a walk, eating lunch together, going shopping, etc. (Because of a limited number of Volunteer Partners, not all participants can be matched with a Conversation Partner each session.)

If you would like a Conversation Partner, request an application

- from the Front Desk staff after you register for an adult class OR
- from your teacher after the semester begins.

IMPORTANT DATES

Summer 2008: July 7 – August 15*

*There will be no class the first class day of the semester. Instead of class, teachers will hold individual appointments with adult students and with parents and children. **However, classes that meet only once per week will have appointments the week before the semester starts and then have class for all students the first day of class.**

CLASSROOM LOCATIONS

Adult and most school-aged children's classes take place at the Northwood Community Center (NWCC) at 1000 McIntyre Drive, at the corner of Hubbard and McIntyre, one block west of Huron Parkway. The 4 1/2–6 Year-Olds class and all preschool classes take place at 1588 Cram Circle, between Hubbard Road and Bishop Street, in Northwood I.

PARKING

Non-residents of Northwood Community Apartments can buy monthly parking permits for \$2 to \$20 per month, depending on how many days per week they attend class. To buy a monthly permit, please bring your car license plate number and receipt for class payment to the Northwood Community Center Front Desk.

**2—3 1/2 Year-Olds (With a Parent)
M, W, F: 11:00 am—12:00 Noon, 1588 Cram Circle**

This class is for children who have little or no experience with English. Parents attend this class with their children and play an important part in helping their children learn English. Children learn English through songs, finger plays, art projects, and games. The first 20 minutes of class will be for play and informal interaction in English. The remaining time will include a period of formal instruction and corresponding activities.

**3 1/2—5 Year-Olds
M, W, F: 1:30—3:30 pm, 1588 Cram Circle**

Children in this age group learn basic English vocabulary, listening and speaking skills, and U.S. culture through songs, art projects, and games. **PLEASE NOTE:** If your child is only 3 1/2 years old and has had little experience attending preschool, we recommend that you attend the 2—3 1/2 Year-Olds class with your child first, before registering him/her in this class. Sorry, teachers will not change diapers.

**4 1/2—6 Year-Olds
M, T, Th: 4:30—6:30 pm, 1588 Cram Circle**

This class is for children entering kindergarten and first grade. Basic English vocabulary and U.S. culture will be taught through songs, art projects, games, and other activities. Listening and speaking skills will be emphasized, but basic reading and writing will also be included.

Topics and materials in all preschool classes, English for Everyday Life, conversation classes, and Advanced Speaking/Listening are different in fall, winter, spring, and summer semesters.

CHILDREN'S CLASSES

**Beginning Elementary-School-Aged
M, T, W, Th: 12:45—3:45 pm, Room 250, NWCC**

This course is for children ages 7-10 who have recently arrived in Ann Arbor and who may be attending elementary school (grades 2-5) in Ann Arbor for the first time in September. Basic vocabulary, directions, and survival/conversational skills will be covered. In addition, children and parents will be introduced to the Ann Arbor Public Schools.

**Beginning Teens
M, T, W, Th: 12:45—3:45 pm, Room 252, NWCC**

This course is for teens ages 11-17 who have recently arrived in Ann Arbor and who may be attending middle, junior high or high school (grades 6-12) in Ann Arbor for the first time in September. Basic vocabulary, directions, and survival/conversational skills will be covered. In addition, teens and parents will be introduced to the Ann Arbor Public Schools.

**Intermediate Elementary-School-Aged
M, T, Th: 4:30—6:30 pm, Room 250, NWCC**

This class is for children ages 7-10 who have already attended elementary school here in Ann Arbor from two to twelve months, or who are beyond a basic level of English ability. Stories, games, songs, and projects will be used to help the children practice and improve their English during the summer.

**Intermediate Teens
M, T, Th: 4:30—6:30 pm, Room 252, NWCC**

This class is for teens ages 11-17 who have already attended middle, junior high or high school in Ann Arbor from two to twelve months, or who are beyond a basic level of English ability. Reading, writing, speaking, and vocabulary skills will be developed.

ADULT CLASSES

**Beginning Conversation
T, Th: 9:30—11:30 am, Room 114, NWCC**

This beginning level course is for people who have learned some basic English vocabulary and grammar. However, they still have great difficulty understanding and speaking English in conversational and social situations. Class participants will learn about and practice language and customs that can help them feel more comfortable participating in conversational and social situations. Topics this semester will include travel and talking with neighbors.

ADULT CLASSES

**English for Everyday Life
M, W, F: 1:30—3:30 pm, Room 114, NWCC**

This beginning to intermediate level course is for people who have learned some basic English vocabulary and grammar. However, they still have great difficulty understanding and speaking English. They especially have problems conducting everyday tasks in English, such as ordering in restaurants and buying medicine. Class participants will receive instruction and practice in performing daily tasks in English. They will also receive information on the Ann Arbor community and surrounding area.

**Everyday Conversation
Th: 6:45—8:45 pm, Room 114, NWCC**

Practice your conversation skills! Talk about topics and situations that occur in daily life. This beginning to intermediate level course is for people who have learned some basic English vocabulary and grammar. However, they still have difficulty understanding and speaking English in daily tasks and social situations. Class participants will learn and practice language and customs that can help them communicate in daily life.

**Intermediate Conversation
M, T, Th: 4:30—6:00 pm, Room 114, NWCC**

This intermediate level course is for learners who can speak and understand basic spoken English. They can participate in general conversations, but they would like more instruction, practice, and cultural information to help them make conversation and handle various social situations more easily. Topics this semester include cultural adjustment and describing experiences.

**More Listening and Speaking
M, W, F: 9:30—11:30 am, Room 114, NWCC**

Improve your listening comprehension and become more comfortable speaking. This intermediate level course is for people who have learned some basic English vocabulary and grammar. Class participants will practice listening to conversational English and speak about topics related to listening activities. **NOTE: You can take this class even if you did not take Listening and Speaking in the spring semester.**

**Advanced Speaking and Listening
M, W: 6:45—8:45 pm, Room 114, NWCC**

This is an advanced level class for people who can converse easily about general topics but want to further improve their listening comprehension and speaking skills. Various topics will be discussed and idioms, shades of meaning, and different ways to say things will be explored.
